We hope that you have all experienced a safe and enjoyable Christmas holiday period and we are excited to welcome you back to back to the latest edition of Our Gunyah.


We hope that you enjoy receiving our newsletter and find it useful. If you have anything that you would like to see in any upcoming editions please get in touch with our staff.

Program Delivering Positive

outcomes

The client has chosen to share her story to encourage others to seek help and assistance through the Warranggal Dhiyan program. The images used in this story are stock images and not that of the actual client.

Client Story:

A client was referred to the Warranggal Dhiyan program by her family members. At the time she was serving a three month prison sentence in Women's Correctional Centre and was awaiting a hearing for charges of assault and hinder Police.

Because she had a history of alcohol dependence and subsequent associated negative behaviours, the Magistrate had told her that if a residential vacancy became available in a Drug and Alcohol Rehabilitation centre it would be more appropriate to grant her bail to attend the facility rather than stay in prison.

The client has struggled with having had a difficult past. Her father had taken his own life when she was just a child and she lived with her mother where she was moved from school to school. As an adult she has been in and out of trouble with the law.

The client found it hard on her own to find a vacancy in a Drug and Alcohol Rehabilitation Centre. She only had limited resources and time and unfortunately didn't have access to welfare support at the prisons to assist her.

Once a client intake form and eligibility assessment was successfully completed, Warranggal Dhiyan staff were able to provide immediate support and liaise with the client's solicitor to refer the client to a suitable Rehabilitation facility, where she was able to get into the facility straight away.



The client suffers from anxiety and upon release from prison she did not have any medication and was not given a prescription. A family support worker from Warranggal Dhiyan made an appointment with the local GP and assisted her with filling out the forms for Closing the Gap, this helped reduce her anxiety.

The client was bailed to reside at a relatives place with the provision that she attended Drug and Alcohol Rehabilitation facility for three months. In this time the client's confidence grew along with her recovery. Most rewardingly at Christmas time, she was able to have a week together with her children.

The client found it hard staying strong at times and talked about how it would be easy to relapse, especially when old friends would rock up on her door to have a drink. She would tell them she "doesn't drink anymore" and they would come out with comments such as; "What are you too good to have a drink with us now?" they kept reminding her of the good old times, making it difficult for her to stay in control.

With the assistance of homelessness support services and Warranggal Dhiyan helping with the transition, the client was able to move out of her old residential area.

With the continued support of the Warranggal Dhiyan family support worker, her journey continued until she felt more confident in herself and her own ability to stay strong. As time went on the client has made new friends, who have continued to support her on her journey. She is also now very comfortable in the area that she is living.

She has come so far with the support she has received through the Warranggal Dhiyan program. She now makes the choice to attend Drug and Alcohol Rehabilitation once a week, has enrolled in some short courses at TAFE and even participates in work experience with the intention of re-entering the work force.

The client said she is proud of her accomplishment and wonders at how far she has come, saying she feels more and more confident in herself and in her own abilities.

CATCH UP WITH WALTER, SHANTEL & KATH

For the past five months the Warranggal Dhyian Team has gradually been getting out and about meeting with people across the northwest region and local communities. We have established networks with other services, we liaise with legal services and have identified gaps in current services. We now case manage a wide variety of clients and help support them with the following:

- Assistance with bail to transitioning from prisons to drug and alcohol rehabilitation centres.
- Making sure bail conditions are met by assisting to help clients stay within the bail guidelines.
- Assist with transport to attend local court hearings and in some cases provide court support.
- Assistance to access health and support services through referral and assistance to fill out forms.
- We can provide advocacy at parole reporting and assist with maintaining parole conditions.
- We help assist people overcome any hurdles they may come up against, with a non-judgmental approach.
- We build relationships with services and help you break down barriers.
- Assist with attending drug and alcohol counselling and rehabilitation with the aim of self-improvement and to help keep families together.
- We deliver outreach to remote locations to help raise awareness and allow access of our service.

So far many of our clients have had great success with getting their lives back on track, whether it be just staying out of trouble, reconnecting with lost family, or finding their inner strengths through goal achievement.









Supporting Indigenous clients who have been incarcerated or who are at risk of being incarcerated



Our family support workers are dedicated to helping individuals and families that reside in the North West region of NSW (excluding Moree and Tamworth). Although our office is based in Gunnedah, we operate as an outreach service and will travel to you if and when required.

We are committed to supporting the whole family unit of individuals who have been incarcerated or who may be at risk of becoming incarcerated.

If you are in regular contact with the police or the court system and want to try and break the cycle then this program might be for you. If eligible you will receive a support package including intensive case management that has been developed based on your needs and identified goals.

Dear Residents,



My name is Morad Wasile, I am the new Compliance Officer at Gunida Gunyah.

Basically my job is to make sure that all Tenants are aware of the legal responsibility Gunida Gunyah has towards their tenants and what responsibilities tenants have towards Gunida Gunyah.

I would like to highlight three areas of concern that I plan to look at over the next quarter:

- 1. Rent Arrears,
- 2. Repairs and maintenance; and
- 3. NCAT.

To that end, I have enclosed three factsheets from the Tenants Union about these three topics. The Tenants Union is NSW's legal centre specialising in Tenancy Law. Your local tenants advocate representatives are:

- 1. New England Tenants Advice and Advocacy Service (NEWTAAS),
- 2. Western NSW Aboriginal Tenants and Advocacy Service; and
- 3. Nothern NSW Aboriginal Tenants Service.

I used to work as a Tenant Advocate for NEWTAAS and represented many Tenants at Tribunal. Please feel free to contact me if you are having difficulty paying rent or some damage has occurred in your home. My aim is to assist all tenants in maintaining their tenancy and avoiding Tribunal action.



TENANTS RIGHTS FACTSHEET 06 Repairs and maintenance

As a tenant you have rights under the Residential Tenancies Act 2010 and Residential Tenancies Regulation 2010. This factsheet explains the law in NSW about repairs and maintenance for rented premises.

Your obligations

Under the terms of the standard residential tenancy agreement (your lease), you agree:

- · to keep the premises 'reasonably' clean
- to tell the landlord about any damage or disrepair as soon as possible
- to leave the premises as near as possible to the condition they were in at the start of the tenancy, except for 'fair wear and tear'
- not to damage or permit damage to the premises deliberately or negligently -you are responsible for damage by anyone who you have allowed onto the premises
- not to add or remove any fixtures or do any renovations or alterations to the premises without the landlord's written consent (unless permitted under the tenancy agreement).

If you do not meet these obligations, the landlord may apply to the NSW Civil and Administrative Tribunal (NCAT) for order/s that you comply with your tenancy agreement, or to end your tenancy or for compensation.

The landlord's obligations

The landlord agrees:

- to provide the premises in a 'reasonably' clean state and fit for your to live in
- to provide and maintain the premises in 'reasonable' repair – even if the landlord/agent told you about any disrepair at the premises before you moved in.
- to make any repairs referred to in the original condition report.

'Reasonable' repair depends on the age of the premises, the amount of rent you pay and the potential life of the premises.

The landlord is not required to fix any damage that you cause. However, if they later want to claim compensation from you for that damage they must try to limit the cost of any repair or replacement. Contact your local Tenants Advice and Advocacy Service for advice about this.

Urgent repairs

Urgent repairs means any work needed to repair any of the following:

 a failure or breakdown of the gas, electricity or water supply

- a failure or breakdown of any essential service for hot water, cooking, heating, cooling or laundering
- any fault or damage that makes the premises unsafe or insecure
- serious damage from a natural disaster.

Examples of damage include:

- a burst water pipe
- an appliance or fixture (such as a tap) that is not working or broken and is causing a substantial waste of water
- · a blocked or broken toilet
- · a serious roof leak
- · a gas leak
- · a dangerous electrical fault
- · flooding or serious flood damage
- serious storm or fire damage

Getting urgent repairs done Tell the landlord/agent – in writing if possible – about what needs fixing. Follow up any conversations with a letter. Keep a copy of the letter and a record of any conversations as evidence that you told the landlord/agent.

If there is no electricity or water it may be up to the service provider to fix the problem (if it is outside the boundary of the premises). See also Factsheet 23:

If the landlord/agent cannot be contacted or is unwilling to do any urgent repairs, or if they are taking too long to do them, you can arrange for the repairs to be done. Do not pay any more than \$1,000 or you may not get your money back – the landlord is only required to pay you for any reasonable costs up to \$1,000. They are obliged to pay within 14 days of your notice.

You must be able to show that:

- · the problem was not your fault
- you made a 'reasonable' attempt to contact the landlord/agent
- you gave the landlord/agent a 'reasonable' chance to do the repairs
- the repairs were carried out by a repair person named in your tenancy agreement (if possible) or by a licensed or qualified tradesperson.

You must give the landlord/agent written notice about the repairs, costs and copies of receipts.

If the landlord does not pay, apply to the Tribunal within 3 months from the end of that 14 days for an order that they do so.

06: Repairs and maintenance



If you cannot afford to pay for urgent repairs, apply to the Tribunal for an urgent hearing for the repairs to be done. You can also apply for a rent reduction until the repairs are done. See 'Applying to the Tribunal' below.

Getting other repairs done

Tell the landlord/agent in writing what work needs to be done and by when – give a clear deadline. Keep a copy of the letter and a record of any conversations as evidence that you told the landlord/agent. If you deal with an agent, you can also:

- write details of the problem in the agency's complaint book
- contact the licence holder (the principal or manager) of the agency
- · contact your landlord directly.

Undertaking repairs yourself You must have the landlord's prior consent before undertaking non-urgent repairs or maintenance. Ask the landlord to pay you for any costs. Get their consent and agreement to pay in writing.

If the landlord does not do repairs

- Keep paying your rent. A 'rent strike' is a breach of your tenancy agreement, and the landlord may take steps to end your tenancy.
- · Apply to the Tribunal for order/s see below.

Applying to Tribunal

You can apply for one or more of the following orders if you are having difficulties regarding a non-urgent repair (see above for how to deal with an urgent repair):

- a) that the landlord do the repairs you have specified
- b) that the landlord compensate you for losses you suffered because they did not do the repairs
- c) that all or part of the rent is paid to the Tribunal until the repairs are done
- d) that the rent is reduced for the period that the premises are/were in disrepair.

For (a), (b) and (c) you must apply within 3 months of the landlord failing to meet your deadline for repairs. For (d) you must apply before the end of the tenancy.

See Factsheet 11: NSW Civil and Administrative Tribunal and contact your local Tenants Advice and Advocacy Service for help to make an application. Orders for repairs You must be able to show that:

- the premises were not in reasonable repair
- you told the landlord/agent about the need for the repairs (e.g. you wrote to them) or they ought to have reasonably known about it (e.g. they inspected the premises)
- the landlord/agent did not make a reasonable effort to have the repairs done.

Compensation You can apply for an order that the landlord compensate you for economic loss. For example:

- You had to spend money on take-away food because the landlord failed to fix the stove.
- Your belongings were destroyed or damaged because the landlord failed to fix a leaking roof.
 You must be able to show that your loss was caused by the landlord's failure to do the repairs.

You also need to show that you attempted to limit the cost to you of the damage (e.g. reducing water damage to your furniture by moving it from under a leak) otherwise the Tribunal may not order compensation.

The Tribunal can order up to \$15,000 compensation.

Rent to be paid to Tribunal The Tribunal will usually only consider this order when the landlord has not complied with a previous repairs order. You can include it in your application, in case you have to return to the Tribunal later.

Rent reduction The Tribunal may make an order that the rent is, or was, excessive due to a reduction or withdrawal by the landlord of any goods, services or facilities provided with the premises.

For example: The landlord fails to repair a broken-down hot-water system. Apply for an order that the rent was excessive for the time you were without hot water.

If the Tribunal finds the rent is excessive, it will make an excessive rent order. It will specify:

- the amount that the rent must not exceed
- the day from which this maximum rent applies for a period of up to of 12 months.

TENANTS RIGHTS FACTSHEET 11 NSW Civil and Administrative Tribunal

As a tenant you have rights under the Residential Tenancies Act 2010 and Residential Tenancies Regulation 2010. This factsheet explains how the tribunal settles disputes between tenants and landlords.

About the tribunal

The NSW Civil and Administrative Tribunal is an independent body which deals with certain kinds of disputes between landlords and tenants. It is not a formal court, but its decisions are legally binding. The people who hear cases at the tribunal are called tribunal members.

Most remedies from the tribunal are for breach of contract – not obeying the terms of the residential tenancy agreement. NCAT was established in January 2014 with the integration of 20 formerly separate NSW tribunals, including the Consumer, Trader and Tenancy Tribunal (CTTT).

Applying for a hearing

Application forms are available from:

- tribunal registries or website (phone 1300 006 228 or see www.ncat.nsw.gov.au)
- Fair Trading Centres (www.fairtrading.nsw.gov.au)
- your local Tenants Advice and Advocacy Service.

The form includes advice on how to fill it in. For an urgent hearing, attach a letter to the application saying why it is urgent.

Time limits An application about a breach must be made within 3 months of becoming aware of the breach. Other types of applications have different time limits – check the application form. If the time limit has passed, ask for an extension in your application.

Costs An application costs \$49 (\$12 if you are on a government pension or benefit, Austudy, Abstudy or have a Seniors Card – you must provide a copy of the card or Austudy/Abstudy advice). Fees may be waived or postponed for special reasons.

A summons for a witness or documents costs \$45. (Get advice from your local Tenants Advice and Advocacy Service about this.)

If the tribunal thinks that your application is not serious or that you are deliberately wasting its time, you may have to pay the landlord's costs.

Representation

Tenants usually represent themselves. You can ask the tribunal to let another person (such as a tenant advocate) speak for you, but you will need to convince the tribunal member that you need this. You can bring a friend or family member for support.

A landlord may use a real estate agent to represent them. Solicitors may only represent landlords or tenants with the permission of the Tribunal.

Right to an interpreter

If you need an interpreter, write this on your application or tell the tribunal when you get the notice of hearing. The tribunal will provide one for free.

You should go to the hearing

It is important to attend the hearing as the tribunal can make orders that affect you, even if you are not there. If you do not go, you could later find that:

- you have been evicted
- you have been ordered to pay charges that you did not know about
- everything the landlord said was taken as fact you were not there to give evidence that the landlord was behaving unreasonably or making such claims.

If you apply for a hearing and do not attend, the tribunal will dismiss your application altogether.

Changing a hearing date

If the hearing is set for a date or time that you cannot make, write to the tribunal before the hearing and ask for another date or time. It also helps to ask the landlord/agent personally to agree to a change. You must give reasons for your request. For example:

- you are sick (you must provide a detailed medical certificate that explains why you could not attend the hearing)
- · you want to arrange for someone to represent you
- the landlord has refused to give details of their claim

If you do not hear from the tribunal about your request, attend the hearing as it may go ahead without you.

If you cannot ask for a change before the hearing, you can send someone else to ask for a new date. They will need a letter saying that they can speak for you, and they should also know the facts of your tenancy problem in case the tribunal refuses your request and runs the case without you.

If you are running late for a hearing, call the tribunal and say that you are on your way, otherwise the hearing may be over by the time you get there.



What to take to the hearing

The tribunal member hearing your case will need evidence that supports your arguments. If possible, take 3 copies of documents you want to use - one each for you, the landlord/agent and the tribunal member. These might include:

- the residential tenancy agreement
- · a brief written statement of your case
- · statutory declarations by other people who have witnessed important events or who can support your case (signed by a Justice of the Peace or a solicitor)
- · receipts or quotes (e.g. for rent, bond, cleaning,
- · copies of all letters between you and the landlord
- · photographs that show the problem.

The first hearing

At the first hearing, the tribunal member will ask you and the landlord/agent to try to negotiate an agreement (conciliation). Sometimes a conciliator will help you, but often it will be just you and the landlord/agent. Do not feel pressured into agreeing to something unfair.

If an agreement is made, the tribunal member will write an order based on your agreement. This ends the

If you and the landlord/agent cannot agree during conciliation, you have the right to have your case heard by a tribunal member. The tribunal may hear your matter on the same day or set it to be heard on another day.

During a hearing

In an 'informal' hearing, the tribunal member will listen to you, the landlord, your representative (if any), and the landlord's representative (if any). They will look at any documents, photos or other evidence, and will ask questions. They will then make a decision about the case - known as orders.

If the case is more complex, or either side wants to bring witnesses, a 'formal' hearing may be held. The case will be run more like a court, with evidence usually given on oath or affirmation. The tribunal member will usually ask the applicant (the person who lodged the application) to present their case first, then ask the other side to respond.

Be aware that it is an offence to mislead the tribunal.

Notice of orders and reasons

The tribunal will give you a notice of orders. If you want the reasons for the orders, write to the Registrar within 28 days of getting the notice of orders.

Enforcing an order for payment of money

Orders for payment of money are enforced through the Local Court. You will need a certified money order from the Registrar, See www.lawlink.nsw.gov.au or phone LawAccess NSW on 1300 888 529 for guidance.

Renewing an application

If the landlord does not obey an order (other than a money order) you may apply to the tribunal to have the case renewed. The fee is the same as the original fee.

You must apply within the time given in the original order or within 12 months of the date for compliance in the original order.

Set aside and appeal applications

NCAT decisions can be challenged. The reasons for challenge are limited and time limits apply. Do not delay.

Get advice from a Tenants Advice Service or CLC before commencing any of the following procedures:

- Application to set aside or vary a decision
- Appeals to the Tribunal
- Appeal to the Supreme Court
- Judicial review by the Supreme Court

Fees:

- Set aside or vary: \$101 (conc. \$25)
- Internal appeal: \$414 (conc. \$103)
- Supreme Court: inquire of Supreme Court Registry Fee waiver and/or postponement applications can be made to the Registrar of the Tribunal with your application.

Advice from Assets & Maintenance Team

Hi All.

Well its almost Easter and with that it brings another set of school holidays and busy times.

We are looking forward to the long weekend and the chance to catch up with family and friends as I am sure you are.

Its time a time relaxation too, so we thought that to help you get ready for the busy holiday we might share some helpful tips on cleaning that dreaded shower and keeping it that way once you have it the way you want it. And its all with stuff that we have in the cupboard or cost next to nothing to buy.

You will need white vinegar, dish washing liquid, jiff or cream cleanser, a green scotch brite and a spray bottle and a dry cloth.

First of all you need to mix straight white vinegar and a couple of drops of dishwashing liquid and spray the shower with the mix , next cover the scotch brite with jiff and rub it on the glass and tiles (not to hard you don't want to scratch the glass), making sure you keep it moist with the vinegar mix.

When you have covered all the area simply rinse off.

Here is the important part you must dry the glass off (only once). Your shower will look amazing.

And there is a very simple way to keep it that way.

All you have to do is put your spray bottle on a mist spray and when you have had a shower just mist the shower with white vinegar (no dish washing liquid). You will most likely only have to scrub the shower once a month if it needs it.

IO Things You Should Never Burn in Your Fireplace or Woodstove



It can be difficult to know what not to burn in your fireplace. It's seems like anything that burns should be able to go right in, as the smoke and fumes go right up the chimney. Some items can be a fire hazard or release a cocktail of toxic fumes into your home and neighborhood. We've compiled a list of 10 things you should never burn in your fireplace

- 1. Wet wood. Wet, or unseasoned, firewood can contain up to 45 percent water. When the wood burns, it produces more smoke than seasoned wood, which can cause dangerous creosote to build up on your chimney's inner walls. Wet wood also does not produce as much heat from your home.
- 2. Christmas trees. It can be tempting to cut up and burn your live Christmas tree in your wood-burning fireplace. In addition to not being properly seasoned, the evergreen wood of your Christmas tree contains high levels of resin. These resins burn quickly and can pop, causing a risk of a chimney fire.
- 3. Painted or treated lumber. Painted or treated lumber can contain toxic chemicals that are released when burned. Those chemicals are dangerous for you and your family, and can corrode your fireplace.
- 4. Any type of paper with colored print. Paper with colored print, such as wrapping paper, magazines, cereal boxes, and pizza boxes, may release noxious, corrosive, or carcinogenic gases when burned.
- 5. Plywood, particle board, or chipboard. Manufactured wood products release toxic fumes and carcinogens when burned.
- 6. Fire accelerants or fire starters. Never use accelerants, such as kerosene, gasoline, or grill starter fluid to help get your fire started. The accelerants or fire starters can cause flare ups or heat your fire to extremely high temperatures that are unsafe for your fireplace and chimney.
- 7. Plastics. Any type of household plastic, whether its bubble wrap or a plastic cup, should not be burned in a fireplace. Plastics release toxic chemicals, including hydrochloric acid, sulfur dioxide, dioxins, and heavy metals, that are dangerous for your health and bad for the environment.
- 8. Dyer lint. Dryer lint may be an effective fire starter, but it can release toxic chemicals into your home and up your chimney.
- 9. Cardboard. Cardboard can release toxic chemicals when burned, especially if it has been printed with a logo.
- 10. Driftwood. Even dried out driftwood shouldn't be burned because when burned, it can possibly release salt that can corrode your fireplace and chimney. Remember that the best fuel for your fireplace is the fuel it was built for. Pellets for pellet stoves and dry, seasoned firewood or manufactured fire logs for a wood-burning fireplace. Any other type of fuel puts your home at risk of toxic furnes or chimney fires.







Film crew out & about for upcoming tenant videos







Anzac Biscuits



INGREDIENTS



2 cups rolled oats

2 cups flour

2 cups coconut


11/2 cups sugar

250g butter

4 tbsp golden syrup

1 tsp baking soda

2 tblsp boiling water



DIRECTIONS

- Turn oven to 160°C. Lightly grease oven trays.
- Place oats, flour, coconut, sugar in big mixing bowl.
- Melt butter and golden syrup in saucepan. Take off heat.
- Mix baking soda and boiling water in a cup.
- Add to melted butter mixture in the pan.
- Quickly add to big mixing bowl. Mix well.
- Roll tablespoonfuls of the mixture into balls.
- Place on trays 5cm apart.
- Press lightly with fork.
- Bake for 20 minutes.

CRAFTS & ACTIVITIES

Easter Hat

White Knight Squirts gloss spray paint 50cm square piece of AstroTurf - they may give you an off-cut if you ask nicely!

Thick cardboard box

PVA Wood glue

Roll of corrugated cardboard wrap - you can also use a large cardboard box of you don't want to buy a whole

Bamboo Skewers Dust mask

Plastic Easter eggs x 8 Green braid ribbon x 1 metre

Plastic daisy stem

White pom-pom (or you can make your own)

Kitchen scissors Stanley or sharp, sturdy kitchen knife

Lead pencil Ruler or measuring tape



Activity STEP 1: Making the hat brim and top

Draw around a large (approx. 30cm) dinner plate onto a side of the cardboard box, without crossing any folds

Then in the centre of the circle draw a smaller circle around a side plate

Cut out both circles using scissors, a kitchen knife or (for the cleanest finish) a Stanley knife

STEP 2: Cutting the AstroTurf

Place the brim on the underside of the AstroTurf and trace around the outside and inside using a lead pencil

Cut out both circles using scissors

To ensure a neat inner circle pierce the AstroTurf with the Stanley knife first and then cut using scissors

STEP 3: Cutting out the hat body

Using the inner circle piece of cardboard, wrap the corrugated cardboard wrap around it with a 2 cm overlap to determine the length of your hat body.

Once you know the length, then draw a rectangle using that length and 9cm high

Find the middle of the rectangle and draw a vertical line from the base and up about 18cm. Then place the bunny head cut-out on it, ensuring that the middle of the ears is centred to the line you just drew and trace around the ears, ensuring that it connects to the rectangle.

At each end of the rectangle draw a 6cm x 6cm square (this will be the bunny's bottom)

Using sharp scissors cut out the body of the hat. In some places, like along the straight edge, you can use a Stanley knife for a beautiful clean edge

STEP 4: Gluing the hat body

Turn the body over and then using a ruler flatten the top edge of the corrugated cardboard wrap. This will make it easier to attach to the rim and top of your hat. DO NOT flatten the section of the bunny head.

Place glue 0.5cm down from the top edge of the body of the hat, avoiding the bunny head section (otherwise the glue will make a crease line visible)

Attach the top of the hat to the body, hold until set in place, then leave for an hour or two to fully dry

Place glue on the inside of the brim of the hat and then attach the brim of the hat to the bottom of the body.

Once dry, cut the bunny's bottom into a semicircle

STEP 5: Spraying the hat body

Shake your chosen colour of White Knight Squirts Spray Paint for 1 minute until you can hear the ball moving freely around the can

In a well-ventilated area (outside in the garden is perfect), holding you can upright and approx. 20cm away, spray the inside and outside of the Bunny ears and hat body

Be sure to only do a thin layer each time, allowing 10 minutes between each layer for the paint to dry - you should only need 3 coats

After each use, turn the can upside-down and spray until the colour stops coming out to prevent blockages

STEP 6: Spraying the eggs

The plastic eggs have small holes in the tops of them, put a bamboo skewer through the top of each plastic egg to make them easier to hold and spray

Spray the entire egg white

Leave for 10 minutes to dry

Using all your favourite colours now to add splatters to the eggs, slightly depressing the nozzle so the paint 'splutters' out of the can

STEP 7: Time to decorate

Slip the brim size AstroTurf onto the hat, being careful not to be too rough and mark the paint


Place the smaller AstroTurf piece on the top

There is no need to glue them down as they are quite secure, but you can do so if you wish using PVA glue

Add glue to your length of ribbon braid and attach to the brim of the hat, to hide the exposed corrugated edge

Then the final step, using scissors to cut the flowers and greenery and PVA wood glue or a glue gun attach, your eggs and flowers into position on the hat and glue your pom-pom tail to the bunny's bottom
